Dear Chairwoman Stabenow, Chairman Thompson, Ranking Member Boozman, and Ranking Member Scott,

As you begin the process of developing a new Farm Bill, the undersigned organizations are writing to urge you to include dedicated funding for one-to-one business technical assistance (BTA) for small and midsized farm and food businesses. These investments in farm viability are critical to achieving a more just, secure, and resilient food supply chain, growing our rural economies, and helping farmers and food businesses weather periods of uncertainty, high input costs, and market disruptions.

Recent years have provided stark illustrations of the need to better equip farmers and food entrepreneurs with the business skills and financial literacy necessary to access new markets and succeed long-term in a challenging industry. The coronavirus pandemic, for example, had a significant impact on the farm and food economy, causing dramatic upheavals in markets that many small and midsized businesses relied on, and causing surges in demand in others. More recently, inflationary pressures and supply chain disruptions have significantly increased farm input costs and farmland prices. In both cases, farm and food businesses require an increasing degree of savvy and flexibility in order to remain viable. These recent challenges illuminate the deep historic, systemic, and ongoing barriers facing farmers and food entrepreneurs of color, who have been structurally denied opportunities to access capital, land, technical support, USDA programs, and broader professional advancement for generations.

Business technical assistance (BTA) is critical to meeting such challenges. BTA covers a wide range of one-to-one services offered to farm and food businesses by nonprofit organizations, state agencies, private consultants, and extension services. Customized to meet the unique needs of individual businesses, these services include coaching, skill development, and planning related to financial and labor management, marketing and business strategies, farm transfer and succession, and access to land and capital. BTA has proven effective at creating jobs and supporting local economies. One state program found that two years of business planning support helped businesses generate a 62 percent increase in net income and add jobs at a rate three times that of the sector on average. Further, prioritizing socially disadvantaged producers – the business owners historically excluded from existing programs and resources – supports and uplifts those most vulnerable and marginalized, while meeting the needs of all farmers and food businesses.

Last year, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) further recognized the importance of funding BTA when it announced the establishment of both the Farm Service Agency's

Increasing Land, Capital, and Market Access Program and the Agricultural Marketing Service's Regional Food Business Centers, as well as through cooperative agreements with trusted organizations. Though funding is yet to be awarded for these programs, they include a strong emphasis on services such as financial coaching, business planning, market development, succession planning, land access, and USDA program access. Unfortunately, these initiatives are leveraging ad hoc, one-time funding. We urge you to ensure that the next Farm Bill builds on this important work by including dedicated funding for BTA, delivered in the form of multi-year grants to public and NGO agricultural service providers. We ask that these grants prioritize applicants with a track record of success with providing this type of assistance to socially disadvantaged and historically underserved producers.

Thank you for your consideration of our request. We are eager to work with your committees to further support farms, ranches, and food businesses in the 2023 Farm Bill.
